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




SHARE CHRIST


Group Structure

Groups meet throughout the year in three semesters. New groups start every semester making it easy to build community and enjoy different types of groups.

- FALL SEMESTER: 13 WEEKS (Early September Early December)
- WINTER SEMESTER: 13 WEEKS (Early February Early May)
- SUMMER SEMESTER: 6 WEEKS (Early June to Mid-July)

Groups meet _____ or ____ during each semester. Groups meet in a variety of places like homes, parks, restaurants, coffee shops and office buildings.

No matter what your group meets about, each meeting should be made up of four things:



This will vary based on what kind of group you're leading. It could be an activity like Frisbee or outreach or a discussion about a book or Sunday message.

Ask for prayer requests from group members and pray at the beginning and/or the end of each group meeting.

This is what differentiates your Small Group from your neighborhood supper club. Whether it's through activities or discussion, always find a way to include the Word of God. This can be as simple as sharing something God is teaching you with the group or talking about a verse you read that week.

The foundation of Groups at StoneBridge is built on the **ESPN** model: Encourage, Scripture, Prayer, and Next Steps. Below are some common elements that make up a Small Group and some information to help you fill in the space above. The format for your group is up to you. Mix and match the parts to write a brief description of what you will do when you get together.

Eat Together - Some groups enjoy coffee, a light snack, or even a meal together. What will that look like for you? Are you meeting at a restaurant or coffee shop where people can treat themselves? Will you be meeting at your home (or someone else's) and ask people to bring something to share? Eating together leaves room for casual conversation and personal relationships to grow.

Have Fun - Some groups are activity-based and participate in things like bike riding or ultimate frisbee. Even Bible study and discussion groups can engage in an icebreaker or game before digging into the content. These activities open the door for folks to let down their guard and relax.

Grow Together - All groups make time to "spur one another on to love and good deeds" (*Hebrews 10:24*) through intentional discussion. What will you discuss?

The Importance of Prayer

Prayer is important for your Small Group.

If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land.

How to pray for your group:

- Pray for any requests group members share.
- Ask for the presence of the Holy Spirit in your group.
- Pray that God will open people's hearts to hear His truth.
- Pray for authentic community to develop.
- Pray for wisdom and strength to lead your group well.

Confidence as a Small Group Leader

If you only do what you feel comfortable doing, you don't need God. God's best is often found outside your comfort zone. When you serve God and people by leading a Small Group, He will equip you and give you the strength and wisdom to lead well.

For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline.

When you feel like you don't know how to help someone in your group, remember ESPN:

E: Encourage - Demonstrate compassion, inspire them with courage, and let them know that there is hope.

S: Share Scripture - Show them Biblical truth concerning their situation.

P: Pray - Don't just say you will pray for them. Take a moment and do it right then.

N: Next Steps - Help them put feet to their faith by coaching them to discover what their next step can be

How to create good group dynamics:

O1 A k

Set expectations.

A key to helping people feel comfortable in your group is to let them know what to expect. Take time to share how the group will flow from week to week. This can include things like explaining the times you will begin and end the group, how discussion or group activities will happen, and how group members can share prayer requests or best engage in the group.

02

Follow the 70-30 rule.

Give the members of your group room to speak up instead of doing all the talking yourself. About 70% of talking should come from members and 30% from the leader.

K

Keep conversations in a healthy place.

03

If conversation takes a negative or destructive turn, guide it back to a healthy place. If someone needs to talk about a sensitive or complex issue, you can follow up with them after the group or call your coach to help you respond well.

04

Keep the conversation relevant to everyone.

Remember people in your group will be at different places in their spiritual journey. Be thoughtful when you talk about spiritual concepts or church terms that might be unfamiliar to new Christians or new church-goers.

05

Respect boundaries.

We want to maintain integrity and purity in our Small Groups. Boundaries will help protect the leaders and group members from entering into an uncomfortable or inappropriate situation.

HOW TO START YOUR SMALL GROUP

- 1. Ask God for direction about what group to lead and who to invite.
- 2.Once you decide on a topic or activity for your group, choose a place and time to meet.
- 3.Register your group in the online Small Groups Directory at **www.sb.church/groups** so people can find it and contact you to attend.
- 4. Invite people you know or meet to come check out your group.
- 5. Pray for God to do great things through your Small Group.

Preparing for your group meetings:

- Send a message to group members reminding them about the first meeting. If meeting virtually be the first to join the video call and welcome participants as they arrive.
- Arrive early to set up a welcoming environment.
- Consider having name tags available to help everyone learn names for the first few weeks. If meeting virtually, invite everyone to put their full names on the screen and keep their cameras on.
- Conversation: Here are a couple conversation starters to help get people talking as your group gets to know each other:
 - How did you learn about our group?
 - What are your hobbies?
 - What are you looking forward to this year?
 - What brought you here?
 - What are you hoping to get out of this Small Group?

LAUNCH NIGHT

Preparation

We firmly believe that everything begins and ends with the foundation of prayer. However, we also need to prepare for what happens in between those moments. You must prepare yourself spiritually (heart), physically (body), and mentally (mind). A failure to plan is a plan to fail. Flying by the seat of your pants is not a spiritual gift.

Now that your roster is being filled, you need to communicate with them about the details - the when, where, why, how, and who. Here is StoneBridge's standard for accomplishing this: Join Requests.

Next, you need to prepare for your participants by thinking ahead about how you will engage their five senses. It's about the atmosphere. How will you cater to their 5 senses: sight, sound, smell, touch, & taste? Think about what they will see as they approach your driveway: is your location visible? What will they hear, see, and smell as they walk into your home (or location)? Who will greet them at the door? What refreshments will be offered (taste)?

PASTORAL CARE

As a Small Group Leader, you are never alone. The Pastoral Care Team is available to minister to people who need more help than what they can get in a prayer line or Small Group. We help people who are going through a personal crisis with problems such as:

- Marriage & family problems
- Financial issues
- Domestic violence & abuse (current or previous)
- Employment
- Counseling referrals
- Inner healing
- Trauma
- Mental health
- Substance addictions sexual addictions
- Senior services

They are not here to replace the Small Group Leaders but are here to come alongside them. Should you have an emergency and need to speak to a pastor, call the church office at 402.571.2038 or email care@sb.church and a pastor will be in contact with you. During the evenings and weekends, call the same number and you will receive instructions on how to contact a pastor. We love you and we are here for you!

MAKE A **DIFFERENCE**

- Provide yard clean up/beautification for elderly, widowed, or single mom

Remote and Virtual Ideas

- Decorate lunch bags for your local Meals on Wheels program
- Create fidgets/sensory toys for local organizations
- Write/Decorate a hope note or card for nursing homes, hospitals, etc
- Create quarantine kits for your local community center or homeless shelter
- Host a Shoe Drive (Samaritan's Feet)
- Create no-sew blankets for hospitals, homeless shelters, care facilities, or pet shelters
- Put together goody bags for service members

- Assemble and deliver hygiene packs to people experiencing homelessness in your community
- Do a community prayer walk and trash clean up

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How can I recruit people to come to my group?

- Start with people who are already in your sphere of influence (co-workers, friends, and neighbors).
- Find people around you who are new to the church, are new believers, or have shown interest in getting involved.
- Look for people you think you can help to realize their potential.
- Ask God to send the right people to your group.

Where can I hold my Small Group?

We encourage Small Groups to meet outside the church building in places where you like to spend your time. Some of the most common meeting places are homes, restaurants, parks, coffee shops, and office buildings.

Where can I find Small Group curriculum?

You can visit our website to use one of our featured curriculums. We have a variety of curriculum suggestions available to you on RightNow Media as well as our small group leader resources page on our website.

Does StoneBridge offer childcare during Small Group meetings?

You are welcome to choose to offer childcare at your Small Group. Most groups coordinate within the group to recruit someone to watch the kids and pay him/her.

How do I measure if group members are moving one step?

Ask! Make it part of your discussion whether in a group setting or individually. Here are some great questions to guide your conversation:

DAILY DEVOTION

- What has God been teaching you recently?
- What have you been reading in your Bible?
- What is God doing in your life right now?
- What areas are you wanting to grow in? How will you achieve this? How can I best support you in that?

PRAYER

- How can I be praying for you?
- Have you seen God answer any prayers in your life recently?
- Pray together

FREEDOM FROM STRONGHOLDS

- What are some things you are struggling with right now?
- What are some of the hard things in your life right now?
- What can I be praying about for you? (specifically about the individual)

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

- Have you been a part of serving anywhere in our community?
- Have you been on a mission trip before?
- Have you thought about going on one with StoneBridge? (Mexico, Israel, Ecuador)

SACRIFICIAL GENEROSITY

- What is your experience with giving?
- What gets in the way of you being a regular, faithful giver?
- Have you seen God provide for you recently?

SHARING YOUR STORY

- Have you invited anyone to join you on a Sunday?
- Tell me about your story?
- How did you start coming to StoneBridge?
- Where was the turning point for you with Jesus?
- How has Jesus changed your life?

CELEBRATION

- What have you seen God do in your life recently?
- How have you grown in the last several months?
- What can we praise God for today?
- Have you been baptized?

COMMUNITY

- Do you feel like you are a part of a community here at StoneBridge?
- Who are your people? Where do you feel like you have the most support?

SERVING

- Do you know what your spiritual gifts are? What are they?
- Do you think you are using the gifts God has given you to best serve?
- Notice the strengths you see in this individual, tell them what you recognize and help them see how they can use these gifts to further God's kingdom and serve in their sweet spot!

Everyone in your group will be at different places spiritually. The vision of helping them "move one step" is not to get them to do everything at once, it's to help identify where they currently are spiritually and offer a practical next step to help them grow.

Here are some examples of next steps you can share depending where a group member is spiritually:

- Invite them to attend a Sunday service with you.
- Share your personal story and what God has been teaching you.
- Share how First Steps can help them discover their purpose and invite them to attend.
- Invite them to consider being baptized. Invite your Small Group to be there to celebrate anyone getting baptized.
- Share how you find time regularly to pray, worship, and read God's Word, and encourage them to make their own plan for time with God.
- Tell them about the YouVersion Bible app and RightNow Media resources.
- Encourage them to learn more about areas like tithing, the Holy Spirit, prayer, and relationships by going through a Rooted group.

What should I do if someone asks a question I can't answer?

It's okay to not have all the answers. Thankfully, we can find guidance through prayer, God's Word, and the Holy Spirit. Encourage them to spend time reading the Bible and praying. Also, let them know that you will do your best to get some information and get back with them at your next Small Group meeting. Do some personal research and call your coach to get advice.

How can I share stories of life change from the Small Group semester?

We love hearing about lives that are changed through Small Groups. You can share your stories with your Campus Pastor or submit them at our website.

Do you consider a "ministry team" as a Small Group?

We consider all of our Volunteer Teams as Small Groups; however, we still encourage people to be in a Small Group that meets outside of their serve team. On Sundays, the main focus is serving others; in a Small Group, the main focus is to get refilled and build relationships with one another, and both are needed.

In addition, we also try to make Small Groups the focus of every area of our church. Every event or conference will always point people to join a Small Group. Regardless of the team one serves on, he/she is also representing a Small Group and the Small Group culture of relationship.

Can new people jump into groups in the middle of the semester?

Yes! Some groups are more conducive to that than others and so we point people to those groups. The Small Groups Team at each campus usually has some great groups to point new people to once the launch season is over. Leaders can "close" their groups once they are full or cannot accommodate new group members.

What should I do if someone in my group shares something with me (or the group) that requires attention beyond what I can provide?

If you encounter a difficult situation within your Small Group, please know that you are not alone. If a member is going through a crisis, you can rally the group around them to provide prayer, encouragement, and support. Use wisdom and be sensitive to the situation. If you are unsure of what to do , don't hesitate to ask your Campus Pastor or staff member.

ABUSE POLICY

When someone talks to you about their experience of abuse they are giving you a high compliment. This kind of disclosure is risky and vulnerable. The level of trust they are investing in you speaks to how much they trust you and value your friendship. *Because God loves the oppressed* (Ps. 9:9), we must take seriously our call to be both God's ambassadors and part of His refuge.

Because God calls us to honor our governing authorities (Rom. 13:1-6), we must understand the laws that define our obligation to report abuse. In our country, this understanding begins with knowing the difference between when reporting abuse is mandated and when the victim must press charges. This requires us to understand the difference between abuse against a minor and an adult. **Reporting abuse is mandated when it is against a minor**.

What is abuse? Any of these six actions:

- 1. Inflicting or allowing non-accidental, serious physical injury
- 2. Creating or allowing a substantial risk of non-accidental, serious physical injury
- 3. Using or allowing cruel or grossly inappropriate procedures or devices to modify behavior
- 4. Committing, permitting, or encouraging the rape of the child or other sexual crimes
- 5.Creating or allowing serious emotional damage to the child
- 6.Encouraging, directing, or approving delinquent acts involving moral turpitude committed by the child

What is neglect? Any of these five criteria:

- 1. Does not receive proper care, supervision, or discipline
- 2. Suffers from abandonment
- 3.Is not provided necessary medical care
- 4. Lives in an environment injurious to the child's welfare
- 5. Has been placed for care or adoption in violation of the law

You may think, "What if I'm not sure that abuse is taking place?" As citizens, we are not asked to be investigators; the criterion is "reasonable suspicion." Each report to Child Protected Services (CPS) is vetted by the social worker taking the initial information and their supervisor before any action is taken. Your next question may be, "Who do I call?" The answer to this question is the *child protective services office in the county in which the child has residence.* Too often when we have legal obligations, we can become sloppy in how to execute our responsibilities. We think about protecting ourselves (i.e., liabilities) more than caring for the person.

HELPFUL SCRIPTURE REFERENCES

At StoneBridge Christian Church we believe ministering through the Word of God is the most powerful way to care for people. As you pray over a Small Group member, try inserting that member's name in the Scripture to make it more personalized.

As a leader, we encourage you to find and memorize at least three Scriptures, which will equip you when you are walking someone through a tough situation, as well as give you strength as a leader throughout the semester.

Here is a list of powerful Scriptures that you can apply to any situation:

"And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. This is the first commandment. And the second, like it, is this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these."

MARK 12:30-31 NKJV

Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

PROVERBS 3:5-6

My thoughts are nothing like your thoughts," says the LORD. "And my ways are far beyond anything you could imagine. For just as the heavens are higher than the earth, so my ways are higher than your ways and my thoughts higher than your thoughts.

ISAIAH 55:8-9 NLT

This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us—whatever we ask—we know that we have what we asked of him.
